





MAURITIUS EXPORT – Rs 100Bn




MAURITIUS IMPORT – Rs 300Bn







1. State Investment Corporation

The **Rs 80 billion** being managed by the **Mauritius Investment Corporation** (**MIC**) have not produced results in the way of economic recovery. Most economic indicators remain in the red and an untold number of informal businesses continue to struggle to keep head above water. Out of the Rs 80 Bn, **Rs 52.3 Bn** has already been invested opaquely ...

Mauritius Investment Corporation will be transferred to SIC (<u>State Investment Corporation</u>) and SIC will invest in development projects to **boost Economic Development**, to create new industries, new jobs and work on projects implementation all with the private sectors, giving **priority** to **SMEs**.

SIC-Research: To invest in Research and Development, multi-sectoral. To partner with world leaders in different fields including academia, to employ foreign experts and our local graduates, to develop local Intellectual Property.

SIC-Innovate: To invest in creative services industries to develop **high-end services**, be it in the Digital, media arena to artistic/cultural. The objective is **Go-Export**, Go-International, with a national brand.

SIC-Green: To tackle and invest into **Agroecology**, Food security, vertical farming, cluster SMEs in those fields. A minimum of **25,000 jobs** will be created in this sector. The **Cannabis Industry** will be launched, and every individual, SME or large company will be welcome.

As for textile clusters, the existing industries already have necessary equipment and factories to manufacture new yarns including new materials as mix hemp/silk or hemp/cotton including the knowhow required. There is room for a new fashion industry with high-value products to boost exports.

SIC-Blue: To invest Blue economy, in Fish/ Seafood industries including real vessels.

Rs 10 billion of yearly imports on seafood has to stop

Some **5 commercial fishing vessels** for deep sea fishing to be purchased in very short term and a budget of Rs 800 million is planned for the first year.

Fishermen associations and syndicate will become major partners with SIC-Blue.

In parallel, to study **re-habilitating Grand-Port region** as a modern fishing port with seafood transformation in the region whist gradually preparing for a second port for leisure activities as yacht harbour, ... Rs 500 million is budgeted for the first year and Rs 5 billion over the next years.

SIC-Power: To **invest** in **renewable energy** sectors as hydro-energy, tidal-waves, wind, Solar. The CEB will invest in modern technologies including waste-to-energy, biomass, together with the private sector in order to achieve our objective to fight against climate change and for a Clean Mauritius.

SIC-Transform: To work and invest with local industries to enhance our products quality and processes. Thus, importing less and exporting more. Increase efficiency and output to support profitability of the sectors.

This includes industry 4.0/5.0 transformation, support inter-cluster developments locally.

SIC-Export: In order to grow **export** in several sectors and help local/ regional players collaborate and export, be it SMEs (who have less resources) and medium or large players tap into new markets, a national brand will be created. **ENTERPRISE MAURITIUS**.

Industry associations are welcome to partner in this new 'delivery-based' model. Reunion island, Madagascar, Comoros, Seychelles are also called in to participate. Both products and services are concerned.



The Current Africa Strategy

Many African States are stepping in the phase of economic transition urging an unprecedented opportunity for sustained growth, structural change, and accelerated development. As opportunities emerge and foreign partners flock to Africa, it is particularly important that Mauritius joins the fray.

To that end, the Government is implementing pro-African policies to improve the investment climate, reinforcing economic diplomacy, and enlarging market access to consolidate the position of Mauritius as the strategic partner for African States.

Thus, the government's strategy is to leverage on the geostrategic position to:

- Position Mauritius as the conduit for driving investment to Africa through the MIFC;
- Position Mauritius as the ideal trade platform, tapping on the network of agreements signed (CECPA, FTA China, FTA Turkey, PTA Pakistan, IEPA, AGOA) and the operationalization of the AfCFTA; and
- Boost export of services to Africa, harnessing Africa's demographic dividend, its growing middle class, increasing use of technology, and its rapid urbanization.




High Value Increasing





ECONOMIC COMPLEXITY

OVERVIEW

In 2021 Mauritius was the number 142 economy in the world in terms of total exports and the number 134 in total imports.

EXPORTS

The top exports of Mauritius are <u>Processed Fish</u> (\$241M), <u>Raw Sugar</u> (\$189M), <u>Non-Knit Men's Suits</u> (\$110M), <u>Knit T-shirts</u> (\$89.4M), and <u>Diamonds</u> (\$71.8M), exporting mostly to <u>France</u> (\$240M), <u>South Africa</u> (\$238M), <u>Zimbabwe</u> (\$198M), <u>United States</u> (\$156M), and <u>United Kingdom</u> (\$151M).



The top imports of Mauritius are <u>Refined Petroleum</u> (\$702M), <u>Non-fillet Frozen Fish</u> (\$223M), <u>Cars</u> (\$185M), <u>Packaged Medicaments</u> (\$183M), and <u>Coal Briquettes</u> (\$171M), importing mostly from <u>China</u> (\$1.01B), <u>India</u> (\$787M), <u>South Africa</u> (\$473M), <u>United Arab Emirates</u> (\$441M), and <u>France</u> (\$396M).



METROVERSE CONCEPTS

RELATIVE PRESENCE

A measure of whether an industry accounts for a larger or a smaller share of overall employment in a selected city. In Metroverse, the relative presence of an industry depends on the selected benchmark city or set of cities.

KNOWLEDGE CLUSTER

A set of industries grouped by their technological relatedness. Industries in the same Knowledge Cluster typically share similar know-how or productive capabilities. Knowledge clusters help reveal the knowledge base of a city, as well as its diversification potential.

INDUSTRY SPACE


A unique data visualization that depicts the technological relatedness between industries and in which of these industries a selected city has an outsized presence. Industries that are near each other in the Industry Space typically require similar know-how and can be grouped into Knowledge Clusters. The Industry Space also helps to define which diversification paths may be available to a city, as industries close to those that are already well-developed are likely candidates for growth.
